Figure 1: Changing proportions of Bedfordshire parish registers recording the occupation of the father at baptism, 1538–1812




Figure 2: The geographical distribution of parishes contributing occupational data 1698–1749






Figure 3: The hundreds, boroughs and market towns of Bedfordshire c.1800





Figure 6: Adult male employment in the primary, secondary and tertiary sectors in Bedfordshire, c.1725–1871





Figure 8: Adult male employment in the primary, secondary and tertiary sectors in Bedford, c.1720–1871


